Third annual Zach's Run will raise money for Hunter Syndrome research

Chris and Chervl Dearth received news no parent wants to get.

Their son Zachary was diagnosed with Hunter Syndrome, a genetic disease for which there is no known cure.

"It was devastating," Chris Dearth said.

Hunter Syndrome - also known as Mucopolysaccharidosis Type II — affects the body's ability to break down cell waste. It interferes with the functions of certain cells, leading to serious complications.

Zachary, who is in first grade, was diagnosed as the result of a doctor's appointment in 2005.

The doctors became concerned when the youngster, only 3 at the time, had a hard time "going under" with anesthesia. They also were concerned about the flexibility in his neck, Chris Dearth said.

Doctors told the Dearths to take Zach to see a geneticist, who ultimately made the diagnosis.

Equally frustrating for the family was the fact that researchers haven't put much focus on finding a
